We loved seeing all the different designs, brilliant attention to detail and the children's priorities in packing their hand luggage! The day got off to a fabulous start with the support of Chichester College who brought five of their fabulous Travel and Tourism students to help us man our busy airport. The children checked in and collected boarding passes before passing through security and passport control. Mrs Wickings welcomed the children aboard (fresh from San Francisco... what a hero!) and Peter McKeever (our amazing Clerk to Governors) piloted our planes safely to three long-haul destinations. After take-off they enjoyed refreshments served by the flight a ttendants and munched away while watching some of the inflight entertainment. Our passengers watched their landing in Paraguay, Rio and Manila- using this as a valuable opportunity to see something of the country from the air before disembarking and heading off for the start of their adventures. I am sure you will join me in thanking the brilliant team of volunteers who came together to make the HOOK such a memorable one. This is the first whole-school Geography based learning experience. The ultimate aim of the geography national curriculum is to inspire a curiosity and fascination about the world and its people that will remain with the children for the rest of their lives. 
Our younger children in Year 1 and 2 have new pen-pals who coincidentally emailed after their flight to Rio de Janeiro. Samir and Samira have been in daily contact with our children to tell them about where they live and what it's like there, and asking what it's like in England. We have been learning ways to describe where we live so that we can compare and contrast the City of



Chichester to Rio de Janeiro using correct geographical terminology to describe some of the human and physical characteristics of where we live. Later, we will be entering the rainforest and comparing it to the city to help them become more aware of different locations around the world. Our oldest children in school are using Andy Mulligan's book, Trash, to challenge their perceptions about life in parts of the Philippines: Raphael lives on a dumpsite, eking out a living sifting through rubbish. One unlucky-lucky day, he makes an extraordinary and deadly discovery. Now he and his two friends, Gardo and Rat, are wanted by the corrupt forces that run the city and will stop at nothing to get back what they've lost. From the slums to the mansions of the elite, it's going to take all of their quick-thinking and fast-talking to stay ahead. And to stay alive. Their learning takes them from an all inclusive five star hotel to Smokey



Mountain rubbish dump. During this learning experience, the children will be uncovering a different side of life in the Philippines and using it to deepen their understanding of the interaction between physical and human processes. In their End Goals, the children will be going into role and writing letters from children in Smokey Mountain to children in England, sharing their geographical understanding.



Meanwhile, children in Year 3 and 4 are in Paraguay and being inspired by the true story of Ada's Violin: Ada Ríos grew up in Cateura, a small town in Paraguay built on a landfill. She dreamed of playing the violin, but with little money for anything but the bare essentials, it was never an option..... .....until a music teacher named Favio Chávez arrived. He wanted to give the children of Cateura something special, so he made them instruments out of materials found in the trash. It was a crazy idea, but one that would leave Ada—and her town forever changed. Now, the Recycled

Orchestra plays venues around the world, spreading their message of hope and innovation. The children have been tasked with promoting the orchestras upcoming world tour by producing a factual information leaflet, communicating what it is about the orchestra that makes it so unique and giving the readers a geographical understanding of Cateura.
