

Next up, we caught up with the lovely Mrs Brown to find out more about her as a reader...







Festive recommendations from Koala class




Father Christmas by Raymond Briggs recommended by Milo B

Milo would recommend this for children in year 1 and 2 because the pictures tell the story. He says it leaves him feeling happy and fuzzy and he has really happy memories of watching the film of it with his grandma each Christmas.

On Christmas Eve morning, a very grumpy Father Christmas is dreaming about summer, and certainly doesn't want to get up in the cold to deliver presents! Follow his journey through the night, as he battles the elements to deliver his presents.

Told through a comic strip, with beautiful illustrations based on the houses that Raymond grew up in, this is a hilarious festive tale that has delighted children for generations.



Where the Snow Angels Go by Maggie O'Farrell recommended by Lois

Lois would recommend this book for children between the age of 8-11. She said it is intriguing, full of suspense and very entertaining.

Sylvie wakes one night, suddenly, without knowing why. Then she sees the most spectacular sight - a pair of wings, enormous in size, made of the softest snow-white feathers imaginable. An angel in her bedroom ... a SNOW angel! He tells her that he is here to look after her, for Sylvie is not as well as she seems... Many months later, as Sylvie recovers from her illness, she longs to see her snow angel again. He saved her life! There is so much she wants to tell him, so much she wants to know! Will he ever come back to her? And how can Sylvie make sure that everyone she loves has their own snow angel, to keep them safe, too?



The Christmas Pig by JK Rowling is recommended by Erin

Erin recommends it for children in year groups 3,4,5 and 6 because it has some super descriptions. The book makes you feel so many different emotions: happy, excited, upset, angry and leaves you on a cliff-hanger!

Jack loves his childhood toy, Dur Pig. DP has always been there for him, through good and bad. Until one Christmas Eve, something terrible happens - DP is lost. But Christmas Eve is a night for miracles and lost causes, a night when all things can come to life... even toys. And Jack's newest toy - the Christmas Pig (DP's annoying replacement) - has a daring plan: Together they'll embark on a magical journey to seek something lost, and to save the best friend Jack has ever known...

The Grinch by Dr Seuss

Recommended for everyone by Mylo who says it is exciting and really funny.





The Christmasaurus by Tom Fletcher is recommended by Dexter and Maly Dexter recommends it for children in Key Stage 2 because it has lots of adventures and sends a shiver down your spine. Maly recommended it for all year groups (as a shared read or an independent)

The number-one-bestselling, magical first children's novel from Tom Fletcher, star of BBC's Strictly Come Dancing. This is a story about a boy named William Trundle and a dinosaur named the Christmasaurus. It's about how they meet one Christmas Eve and have a magical adventure. It's about friendship and families, sleigh bells and Santa, singing elves and flying reindeer. It's about discovering your heart's true desire, and learning that the impossible might just be possible . .
