

# Coronavirus Return to School – January 2022

Risk Assessment and Contingency Plan Fishbourne CE Primary School

As well as in reference to the framework provided by the West Sussex County Council, written to support the return of schools in Sep 2021.

## The basic control measures in place are: -

- 1. Ensure good hygiene for everyone.
- 2. Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes.
- 3. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.
- 4. Follow public health advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19.

The risk assessment will be routinely reviewed following UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), DfE and Government advice. The most recent review of this risk assessment took place in January 2022 and was reviewed by the leadership team and full governing body.

School attendance is mandatory for all pupils of compulsory school age and it is a priority to ensure that as many children as possible regularly attend school.

## Coronavirus (COVID-19): Contingency Plan

#### Aims:

\*The purpose of the contingency plan is to outline what the school would do if the number of positive cases substantially increases or how the school would operate if advised to take extra measures to break chains of transmission.

\*If our school or local area sees an extremely high prevalence of coronavirus (COVID-19) infection rates and existing measures in our community have failed to reduce this, the appropriate authorities will decide which additional measures to implement to help contain the spread. These measures may involve implementing a number of restrictions, which could include the partial closure of schools and childcare settings in our area. Measures may also be necessary to help minimise the impact from new coronavirus variants.

\*This contingency plan, also known as an 'outbreak management plan', outlines how the school will operate if further restrictions are implemented. The school will work closely with the local health protection team (HPT) and implement provisions as advised by the team.

\*This is a live document that will be reviewed by the headteacher, in conjunction with other key stakeholders, as and when the situation develops.

#### **Thresholds:**

For most education and childcare settings, whichever of these thresholds is reached first:
5 children, pupils or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely\*, test positive for Covid-19 within a 10-day period.
10% of children or staff who are likely to have mixed closely\* test positive for Covid-19 within a 10-day period.

\*Definition of 'close mixing':

For early years, this could include:

- -a friendship group who often play together
- -staff and children taking part in the same activity session together

For schools this could include:

- -a form group or subject class
- -a friendship group mixing at breaktimes
- -a sports team
- -a group in an after-school activity

#### Actions the school will consider once a threshold is reached:

\*At the point of reaching a threshold, the school will review and reinforce the testing, hygiene and ventilation measures already in place.

\*The school will consider:

- whether any activities could take place outdoors, including exercise, assemblies, or classes
- ways to improve ventilation indoors, where this would not significantly impact thermal comfort

• one-off enhanced cleaning focussing on touch points and any shared equipment

\*The school will seek additional public health advice if we are concerned about transmission in the setting, either by phoning the DfE helpline (0800 046 8687, option 1) or in line with other local arrangements.

# The following measures may also be re-introduced:

Safeguarding	*Ensuring safeguarding arrangements remain effective during periods of restricted attendance is a key priority.			
	*The Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy has been updated to include provisions for keeping pupils safe during the coronavirus pandemic, both at home and in school – we will continue to follow these procedures for pupils who remain at home, where appropriate, until all pupils are able to return to school.			
	*We will continue to ensure that:			
	-The best interests of pupils always come first.			
	-If anyone in the school has a safeguarding concern about a pupil, they act immediately.			
	-Any vulnerable children who remain at home are contacted at least weekly by a member of the leadership team.			
	-A trained DSL or deputy will remain on-site where possible. Where this is not possible, e.g. they are required to self-isolate, the school			
	will ensure that the DSL or deputy, or a DSL or deputy from another school, are available to contact at all times.			
Vulnerable children	*All children who are vulnerable will be invited to attend school. In the case of families who decline a place for their child, weekly contact is maintained through telephone calls, regular emails and visits where appropriate.			
	*The school will continue to provide meals or lunch parcels for pupils eligible for benefits-related free school meals while they are not attending school because of COVID-19 isolation guidelines.

The school recognises the importance of clear communication with all stakeholders and seeks to communicate its plan for addressing any imposed restrictions with parents and staff including in relation to:

- -Opening arrangements.
- -Access for specific targeted groups where applicable, such as certain year groups, vulnerable pupils and children of critical workers.
- -Any reviews of the school's protective measures as part of our risk assessments.
- -The arrangements for remote working.

All relevant stakeholders will be kept up-to-date with the circumstances of any imposed restrictions and how these affect the school as the situation develops.

If any member of the school community wishes to discuss any concerns relating to the school's provision during this period, they should contact the headteacher.

### Changes to guidance coming into effect from January 2022

Changes to the self-isolation period for individuals who test positive for Covid-19 coming into effect at Fishbourne CE Primary from Jan 2022:

Since Wednesday 22 December, the 10 day self-isolation period for people who record a positive PCR test result for COVID-19 has been reduced to 7 days in most circumstances, unless you cannot test for any reason.

Individuals may now take LFD tests on day 6 and day 7 of their self-isolation period. Those who receive two negative test results are no longer required to complete 10 full days of self-isolation. The first test must be taken no earlier than day 6 of the self-isolation period and tests must be taken 24 hours apart. This also applies to children under 5, with LFD testing at parental or guardian discretion. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result and return to your education setting from day 8.

Anyone who is unavlet o take LFD tests will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.

## Daily testing for close contacts of COVID-19

People who are fully vaccinated, or children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years and 6 months, identified as a close contact of someone with COVID-19, should take an LFD test every day for seven days and continue to attend their setting as normal, unless they have a positive test result or develop symptoms at any time.
