Hello to all the little and big fish at the marvellous Fishbourne Primary!


I hope you all had the happiest of Easters and enjoyed all the spoils of those Easter egg hunts! I still have some chocolate left, but only just!

More hilarious elephant based fun from this dazzling duo, listing all the of may wild and wacky creatures you should consider with caution on your summer holiday.






There's a Werewolf in my Tent by Pamela Butchart and Thomas Flintham

Swallows and Amazons by Arthur Ransome






Book recommendations from Penguin Class (Year 4)



We had so much positive feedback from you all about our last edition of Fishbourne Reads and Elephant classes fabulous recommendations that this time we have handed the reins over to our wonderful Penguins!

Luka recommends The Boy Who Grew Dragons by Andy Shepherd because of the themes of positivity and determination (which of course are two of our school learning behaviours!). Luka says the two main characters, Flicker (the dragon) and Tomas make him feel funny, happy and joyful. Tomas finds a dragon fruit tree and a dragon inside it. He calls it Flicker and it actually breathes fire! 'When Tomas discovers a strange old tree at the bottom of his grandad's garden, he doesn't think much of it. But he takes the funny fruit from the tree back into the house - and gets the shock



and delight of his life when a tiny dragon hatches! The tree is a dragonfruit tree, and Tomas has got his very own dragon, Flicker ... Tomas soon finds out that life with Flicker is great fun, but also very ... unpredictable. Yes, dragons are wonderful, but they also set fire to your toothbruth and leave your pants hanging from the TV aerial. Tomas has to learn how to look after Flicker - and quickly. And then something extraordinary happens - more dragonfruits appear on the tree. Tomas is officially growing dragons ...'




'When a priceless painting goes missing, Charley - a 12-year-old viral singing sensation - and her best friend George - camera whizz and budding comedian - are shocked to discover they're the prime suspects. Now Charley and George have to prove they're not international

criminals - all while nailing a stellar European tour and keeping up with their homework! But as news of high-profile heists hits the headlines wherever they go, Charley and George keep finding themselves in the spotlight for all the wrong reasons. Can they solve these baffling crimes and save themselves, or will their shot for stardom be over almost as soon as it's begun?'

Isaac recommends The Wild Robot by Peter Brown which he says is a whole roller coaster of emotions! There are two main characters—Roz (the robot) and Bright Bill (the goose). Roz left Isaac feeling impressed because she learns emotions. Roz is a robot who got washed up on an island in the middle of the ocean. She's a monster but over time she learns the language of the animals. But, there was an accident that changed Roz's life... 'When robot Roz opens her eyes for the first time, she discovers that she is alone on a remote, wild island. She has no idea how she got




there or what her purpose is - but she knows she needs to survive. After battling a fierce storm and escaping a vicious bear attack, she realises that her only hope for survival is to adapt to her surroundings and learn from the island's unwelcoming animal inhabitants. As Roz slowly befriends the animals, the island starts to feel like home - until, one day, her mysterious past comes back to haunt her.'



Ollie recommends The Land of Roar by Jenny McAchlan which he says is an exciting story with lots of funny characters and he thinks it will really pull you in and definitely be exciting! When Arthur and Rose were little, they were heroes in the Land of Roar, an imaginary world that they found by climbing through the folding bed in their grandad's attic. Roar was filled with things they loved - dragons, mermaids, ninja wizards and adventure - as well as things that scared them (including a very creepy scarecrow...) Now the twins are eleven, Roar is just a memory. But when they help Grandad

clean out the attic, Arthur is horrified as Grandad is pulled into the folding bed and vanishes. Is he playing a joke? Or is Roar ... real?'

Molly recommends The Night Bus Hero by Onjali Rauf because it's got adventure, friendship and courage. Her favourite part of the book is when one of the characters found himself helping others when he had never done so before and that this means that if you make a bad choice, you can make it up. 'In this lively, entertaining read, an unsettling encounter with a homeless man sets school bully Hector on the trail of robbers'
