A really warm welcome back to the summer term! We very much hope we will be able to welcome you to all sorts of wonderful events during the summer term including our sports day, church and school fete, year six production, leavers' assembly as well as much, much more! The children are looking beautifully smart in their summer school uni-



forms-thank you for supporting them to attend school READY for learning.



We continue with our work on developing behaviour in school for learning and life with our ready? respectful? safe? approach and have been delighted with feedback from both staff and parents about the impact that this is having. Feedback from the staff survey showed overwhelmingly positive support for the policy and the impact it was having in school. Their reflections were that the

new policy and approach actively values individuality, is simple to follow, focuses on the why, is restorative, is solution focused and develops strong relationships and attachments. Most of all, staff recognise the long lasting impact of the approach. Feedback on the parent survey showed 67% of parents strongly agreed that the school makes sure children understand the expectations around behaviour and a further 30% of parents agreed. Comments from parents included: * I feel that the school genuinely cares and is extremely child focussed. *Every child is valued as an individual. Understanding we are all different! *The nurturing learning environment is exceptional. ! *Staff communicate really well with parents. *It's clear to see how committed staff are to the children and care for them with such kindness.

Learning throughout school has got off to a great

start with exciting HOOKS into learning experiences. Our lovely Cheetahs are enjoying a learning experience inspired by Julia Donaldson's fabulous book, Monkey Puzzle which coincides with the arrival of a very special delivery of caterpillars. The children in Cheetah class have a beautiful collection of books about caterpillars collated by Mrs Whitaker and Mrs Harris to enjoy



together during this learning experience - Cheetah class are story lovers and have had the most varied, delicious diet of stunning books throughout their reception year. The END GOAL of this learning experience will be to re-tell the story of Monkey Puzzle in their very first class assembly. This is something we very much look forward to!



Our Year 5 children are taking part in a narrative based learning experience inspired by the book Cosmic, by Frank Cottrell Boyce. They will use this book to write their own stories that are full of suspense, learning to create a balance of dialogue and narrative to move their stories on, and the use of devices to create suspense and tension – we can't wait to read them! Liam is too big for his boots. And his football strip. And his school blazer. But being super-sized height-wise has its advantages: he's the only eleven-year-old to ever ride the G-force defying Cosmic rollercoaster - or be offered the chance to drive a Porsche. Long-legged Liam makes a giant leap for boy-kind by competing with a group of adults for the chance to go into space. Is Liam the best boy for the job? Sometimes being big

isn't all about being a grown-up.



Our Year 4 class are engaged in an exciting I earning experience called 'Dance Robot' using our brilliant Lego computing equipment. They were hooked into their learning with a Just Dance Routine to 'Can't stop the feeling' which the class learned before going on to create a lego robot and then programme it to perform a dance to the same song! Their learning will culminate with a detailed written evaluation of both their robot and dance. 


Year 3 children were hooked into their geography based learning experience about London with a beautiful book written by Salvatore Rubbino called 'A Walk in London'. Their learning will be an in depth study of how the physical geography of London has changed due to human interference and will result in them writing to a child in another country telling them all about the geography of London. Mrs Williams is busily planning a visit to London to enable the Elephants to see their learning through a different lens-we look forward very much to sharing this with vou soon!

Year 1 children are becoming authors! They received a letter from Fishbourne Pre-School telling them that they need new books because when they returned from the Easter holidays many of their books had gone missing. The letter told them that some of their favourite books were based around animals. The children are going to use a book they are

really familiar with to write their own story using a similar format. They will then publish their books and deliver them in person to Fishbourne Pre-School as a way of making the world a better place for other people in their community. How amazing!

Our Year 2's are historians in their learning experience at the moment, travelling back in time to Sunday 2nd September 1666. They were hooked into their learning by becoming sound detectives. Their learning within this experience will give the children two opportunities to write at length—one inspired by the book 'Toby and the Great Fire of London' and another where they will be the authors of diaries before culminating in a class museum about the Great fire and how London had changed during it.

This learning experience will see the children learning about evolution and adaptation before combining this knowledge with their authorial skills to write a non-chronological report about an aspect of their learning. As a school community who are passionate about learning at all levels, we have developed an approach to the appraisal of our teaching team at the heart of which is a vision for our teachers to become deep thinkers. At Fishbourne we believe there is 'only one you' and that our staff each have different talents and needs. Our ultimate aim is for our staff to become classroom practitioners who consciously think deeply about their practice and who evaluate the impact they have on children's learning on a regular, systematic basis. We do this by facilitating staff to answer an Inquiry Question that:

-challenges our assumptions and allows us to view our classroom practice through a new lens

-allows us explore research evidence

-deliberately changes/tweaks an element of teaching or pedagogy -evaluates the impact of the change for the learners in the classroom

At the moment, our staff team are pursuing two different Inquiry Questions in school:

*What impact does using bar models to unpick word problems over 6 weeks have on children's ability to solve word problems?

*What impact does high quality, group book talk children contributing more readily and effectively in whole class sessions?

During the spring term, we delivered

safeguarding training for our staff team about our approach to keeping children safe online and our online safety curriculum. As part of this training, we shared this short TED talk about the challenge of raising digital natives. It's well worth a watch and provides some helpful


We recognise attendance in schools has been impacted very negatively by
