


experience is much-loved among our entire school family. As ever, our thanks go to Mr Servant for making this happen.

We have been busy planning for our next whole school learning experience, 'Happy from Head to Toe'. This PSHCE based learning experience sets out to support the children to learn more about how to take care of their physical and emotional wellbeing. Recognising that it is not possible or usual to feel happy all the time but knowing how to improve our wellbeing is an important part of growing up and taking responsibility for the choices we make.

During the week, the children will have the opportunity to sign up for three different wellbeing workshops—ranging from yoga to drumming and baking to sewing. Each activity will be led by a different adult who

also uses this as a way of supporting their own wellbeing and the children will be encouraged to talk about how the activity is changing the way that they feel. By the end of the week we will all be writing a pledge about a way in which we commit to taking better care of ourselves.

Developing our school:

Each year, we like to share with our families what we are working on within our School Development Plan. You can read more about how we implement change at our school on the school website under the ABOUT US tab. We recognise that change doesn't happen overnight! Underpinning our school



development plan is an understanding that development is a living and breathing process, one that requires professional tinkering along the way! We are passionate about developing a strong learning and deep thinking culture within our school community at all levels and are relentlessly optimistic about our vision for all learners at Fishbourne Primary.

Our priorities for this academic year are:

*To ensure that key knowledge and skills will be retained more effectively across the curriculum as a result of teaching and learning strategies being informed by the principles of cognitive science *To ensure that teacher assessments of writing are accurate.

*To deliver consistently high quality teaching of reading across school that results in ALL children making at least expected progress from their starting points.

*To quality assure the non-core curriculum through Pupil Book Study. Our School Development Plan is on our website for anyone interested in learning more! We are really pleased with the progress that we are making towards each of these priorities but wanted to make you aware in particular about our emphasis on using cognitive science to understand more about how children retain new knowledge and skill. We have been really enjoying devouring Rosenshine's Principles of learning and using the evidence to inform the way we plan learning for the children. Having time to reflect on each principle and deliberately practise an element of it in our classrooms means



we are able to see the impact it has on the children's ability to recall key knowledge. With just one principle remaining, we will then turn our thoughts to carrying out inquiry questions in our classrooms where we are able reflect deeply on the impact of a given strategy on children's learning. The principles we are learning about which will in turn reflect on your children's experiences are:

- -the way in which we sequence learning
- -techniques for modelling
- -the use of questioning
- -reviewing knowledge on a daily, weekly and monthly basis -opportunities for practising

Each of these principles results in children retaining new learning more effectively.



Working in partnership!

We are always keen to work in partnership with our families and <u>always</u> happy to receive feedback—both positive and ways to develop. We have been made aware that there are occasions when class WhatsApp

groups are not always being used as a force for good and we really encourage you not to enter damaging, negative discussions about school in this forum. Please use these groups as a positive, empowering place to support the work we do serving the families at Fishbourne Primary. We always welcome you to come and chat—pick up the phone, catch one of us on the pathway, ping an email... or come along to our next Cuppa and Chat which is scheduled for Thursday 8th February at 8.45am.

Similarly, if there has been a problem at school with another child, please do not make contact with another family via social media. We are here to support mediation between children and families if there is a need and will always be happy to help. Approaching one another often results in emotionally charged discussions that leave everyone feeling negative and children caught up in the middle of it long after they have moved on!



We are absolutely delighted to have finally received confirmation from West Sussex that our brand new outdoor learning play environment for early years and Key Stage 1 is in the delivery phase! We are anticipating that the groundworks will begin in early February. During this time, there will be some disruption to accessing the school building for children in Shark, Chameleon and Cheetah classes and we will be in touch with those classes to let you know what to expect when the works begin! We have been working on this project for the last three years and overcome a tremendous number of hurdles so it is wonderful that this project is finally underway and should be ready to be enjoyed for the summer term! We are working with a wonderful company called 'Green Play' on this who have completed lots of work for the Forestry Commission and have a real heart for children's play! We can't wait!
