


Thanks also to Chichester Festival Theatre, particularly Richard Knowles, Education Project Manager, at the theatre for facilitating this visit. We are always lucky to find people so willing to help make our children's learning irresistible and who offer our school their resounding support! It reminds me of the African proverb about it taking a village to raise a child meaning that it takes an entire community of different people interacting with children in order for children to experience and grow in a safe environment.



Dear Parents,

We are in the midst of our latest whole school learning experience which we are really enjoying! We are using this opportunity to revisit some of the areas of our School Development Plan that we have been working hard on this year:

- using modelling to support the development of children's writing, particularly key grammar and punctuation skills
- writing for purpose, thinking carefully about our audience



The children have been commissioned by the Chichester Observer newspaper to become theatre critics (**HOOK!**) and will be using their experiences at the theatre to write a review that will be published on the Chichester Observer website (**END GOAL!**) in the coming weeks. We have been working on developing our audience and purpose for writing... it's lovely for the children to have such a public platform for which to write!

On Monday the children received a commissioning email from Phil Hewett, Group Arts Editor, in which he offered some advice:

A good review always make it very clear whether you like the show or not straight away. Always give reasons further down in the review. I always think it should be clear in the first line whether you thought the show was great or awful or somewhere inbetween. Then in the second and third paragraphs you should say what the story is all about. After that, in your review, you should say what you thought of the show and why you thought what you thought. I think it is also remembering a few things...

- * Always be constructive... even if you don't actually like it. Remember lots of people have worked very hard on the show and we should always respect hard work (even if we aren't quite sure about the results!)
- * Never be personal! Always try to keep a professional distance, for example, don't say "I didn't like that actor with the big nose!"
- * Remember this is a great chance to show off all the different words you know! Words like good and bad are boring. Show how big your vocabulary is!

As with all our learning experiences, we started with a baseline and identified personalised steps of learning for each child. Then the children were immersed in a range of different reviews and critiques, including film reviews, restaurant critic reports, book reviews and even looking at our Ofsted report in some classrooms: all presented in a range of different of formats. The children looked at WAGOLL's (What A Good One Looks Like) and discussed the purpose and audience of their chosen style of review, looking at the effect they were trying to have on their readers! Other steps included: collecting vocabulary for this style of writing; modelling evaluative sentence construction; having a go for themselves; paired and shared writing opportunities and so much more!



The children were incredibly fortunate on Wednesday to have the opportunity to meet and work alongside a theatre critic who used to review for The Observer newspaper. Kate Bassett is a journalist, columnist and literary advisor for Chichester Festival Theatre. Kate worked with all the children in school, giving them a unique insight into the way she approaches reviewing a play. It

was absolutely fascinating to hear Kate speaking about her experiences and some of the advice she offered the children: *'Always open with a punchy sentence!*



With all these steps of learning well underway, we were ready to go to the theatre. The excitement built during the course of the week and a great deal of organisation took place behind the scenes to make sure everyone was safely delivered to and from their shows! Our Reception and Year 1 children went off to see Zog in Worthing, while the older children went to the Mayflower to see Matilda. For many of our children it was the very first time they had been to the theatre and expectations were high! The atmosphere was electric and the children's reactions to both Zog and Matilda were magical.



Learning Walls are up in the hall which are being added to every day by all year groups - do pop in if you have a moment to see the steps of learning that are leading up to writing our end goals (these steps of course look slightly different for every year group). They are bursting with the exciting opportunities that the children have had over the fortnight. Look out on the Chichester Observer website in the coming weeks to see some of our reviews published for a much wider audience. All learning journals will come home at the end of the experience so you can see your child's review and see their steps of learning.

This learning experience has been fabulous and it is so lovely to have the opportunity to work collaboratively throughout school on a shared End Goal. Huge thanks, as ever, go to our team of talented staff for their hard work and drive to create bespoke learning experiences for the children at Fishbourne!

I am also delighted to let you know that Rebecca Webb from the University of Chichester will be continuing to work with us next year. We met today to discuss some exciting plans relating to building a community of readers at Fishbourne, developing children with a genuine enjoyment of reading. I'm also pleased that Victoria Jones, our Families Matter teacher will continue to work with families at Fishbourne next year. We are currently planning a new programme that will be accessible to all and delivered at some point during the next academic year.
