What a busy term it has been, packed with exciting opportunities and memorable moments! The build up to Christmas in primary schools is always a very special time and it feels such a privileged as staff to be able to enjoy it with the children! There's no doubting the excitement in school over the last few weeks and we hope that this spills over into your own celebrations with your children at home!



The last couple of weeks of term are, as ever, jam-packed with wonderfully Christmas themed learning... particularly this year with our whole-school learning experience, Nativity! This learning experience is rooted in Religious Education learning and the first time we have used the new 'Understanding Christianity' materials which we are introducing to school as part of our review of the non-core curriculum. We really love our whole-school learning experiences because they give staff an opportunity to plan collaboratively and the shared enjoyment of learning about the same subject at the same time in school is really powerful.





Following this, the children were introduced to three key enquiry rollowing this, the children were introduced to three key enquiry questions which they would use to frame their thinking during the rest of the learning experience. Children in reception, Year 1 and 2 are exploring the question: Why do people perform nativity plays at Christmas? While children in Year 3 and 4 are asking: Why is Christmas important to Christians? Our oldest children are debating: Was Jesus the Messiah? These three key questions led to further questions that framed a sequence of teaching and learning in each year group.

Why do Christians Perform Nativity Plays? What do we celebrate at this time of year? How do Christians celebrate? How can we make the world a better place at Christmas? What is a Christingle? What is the nativity story? Who are the characters in the story? Why do we tell the nativity story?

#### Why is Christmas important to Christians?

How do we know if someone is special? What is Christmas? Who are Christians and what do they believe? Why was Jesus born? How do Christians get ready for Christmas? What is incarnation? Does Jesus make a difference to Christians lives? How can we share our special qualities with others?

### Was Jesus the Messiah?

What does 'messiah' mean? What is a messiah? Who is Jesus and what do you know about him? What attributes does a person need to be a messiah? How do Christians put their beliefs in practice at Christmas? What evidence is there that Jesus was the messiah?

The END GOAL for the learning experience will be for each class to contribute to the Christmas service with their reflections on each of the questions which our Worship Team will then weave together with carols and prayers. The steps of learning they take over the coming days will build their knowledge and skills within RE and what follows is a brief round up of some of the learning that has been going on during this time throughout school.

As part of their exploration of Christmas tradition and symbolism, the children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 visited our parish church to take part in a Christingle service. Prior to going to church they made their Christingles and spent time learning about the symbolism involved:

The orange represents the world. The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ. The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations. The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.





Children in Tiger and Meerkat classes (Y5/6) have children in Tiger and Meerkat classes (4576) have been exploring symbolism in religious art and spent time zooming into John Piper's tapestry at Chichester Cathedral. The subject of the tapestry is the Holy Trinity which is represented by the central green triangle as a symbol of indivisibility. God the Father - the Light of the World - is represented by the white disc of the sun. God the San is represented by the number all cross [Greek Son is represented by the purple tau cross [Greek letter T], and the Holy Spirit is represented by the feathered flame. The children are going on to

create their own pieces of artwork inspired by their learning experience.

Children in Koala and Panther classes (Year 3/4) have been finding out the true meaning of Christmas. They have designed a room for a baby, walked around the school to find Christian signs of Christmas, and explored symbols and traditions of advent. This resulted in some fabulous advent poems highlighting God's rescue plan for the world. They then moved on to create collages of their interpretation of the word incarnation.



### Here are some of the children's reflections

Christians perform nativity plays at Christmas because they want to remember the birth of Jesus Christ. God can do extraordinary things to ordinary people, like Mary. The story reminds us as Christians that we should follow Mary and Joseph's example. They both were brave, courageous, determined and loving.



Christmas is important to Christians because it is Jesus' birthday. Jesus was special because he is God's son and because he saved everyone's life. When he was sacrificed on the cross, people were able to be friends with God again. Christians celebrate all this at Christmas because Christians care for Jesus and celebrate his birthday. he could make dead people alive again, calm storms and he accepted the fact that he had to die on the cross to forgive us for our sins. In Matthew 21: 8-9 it says that the descendent of David would ride into Jerusalem on a donkey. Jesus fulfilled this prophecy. Isla, Year 5

I believe with all my heart that Jesus is indeed the Messiah. Messiah means 'the chosen one' or 'saviour'. Did you know Saviour means Christ? Evidence has proved this.
