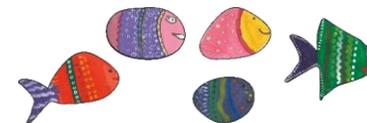


# Pupil premium strategy statement 2020-2021

This academic year presents significant challenges for meeting the needs of our disadvantaged children across the school and has limited the choices we have available to us in the way in which we are working in order not to compromise our C-19 security. As a result, we have minimised the movement between/across bubbles which in turn reduces the flexibility we have in terms of staffing. This results in our choices of strategy being more limited.

<p>C  Specific support for children in EYFS and Year 1 and their families to support engagement with learning from the outset of their time in school.</p>	<p>A number of children starting in EYFS have significant delay in speech and language. Following the completion of the baselines and identification of those children who will benefit from it, there will be a S&amp;L intervention. The school has applied for the Nuffield Early Language Intervention (NELI) and waiting to hear if we have been successful in this. If unsuccessful, the school will consider what programmes that exist in school will be delivered by the existing EYFS team/s.</p> <p>Engagement with families of disadvantaged children from the outset of their time in school – ensuring that families attend learning review meetings and are supported to engage in their children's learning beyond the school.</p> <p>Families provided with additional picture books to build a collection at home, books that children can keep and become part of their home.  £200</p>	<p>Charles Deforges wrote a paper called 'The impact of parent involvement, support and family education on pupil achievement'. Currently 20 children are being mentored in school and supported/encouraged by a middle leader who is also responsible for: *championing all PP children in terms of expectations of all staff to have very high expectations, positive and aspirational relationships with them *tracking progress of PP children through Book Looks, data drops and pupil conferencing</p> <p>½ a day non-contact time half termly to coordinate mentorship programme. £600 Hot chocolate/biscuits £100</p>	<p>At Fishbourne Primary we know that each of our children is unique and will have different needs to be met, particularly after the period of lockdown. We know that it is especially important at this time that the High Quality First Teaching in the classroom is dynamic and responsive to the changing needs of the cohort. It is essential, for teachers to meet the changing needs of their class effectively and for them to have sufficient adult support in the classroom to do so.</p>	<p>Class teachers to attend 25% of the forest school nurture sessions to see their children learning in the outdoor environment and to connect with them. Baseline assessment to be carried out by Chichester Forest School and a final assessment carried out.</p> <p>ELSA to receive supervision from the Educational Psychology team.</p> <p>Daily planning meeting in classroom teams from 830 – 840 to outline the specific plan for the day and reflections between 315-330</p> <p>Personalised learning opportunities are dynamic and responsive to the changing needs of the cohort. Teaching staff use AfL strategies to rapidly identify those children in need of additional support to grasp a key concept or to master their next step of learning. Teaching teams have autonomy to identify how best to use this time each week to benefit those children in need of catching up. This catch-up time may be organised differently each week and should include different groups of children as needed.
