I would also like to thank the staff team who make up our Fishbourne family. The teaching team have been incredible - instantly seeing the second lockdown as an opportunity to refine and improve their practice in remote learning by providing both the children at home and those at school with opportunities to engage and connect with their learning. For the value that they have each placed on the 'power of connection' and the way in which they have continued to support each and every one of the children in their care. Our amazing team of learning support assistants who have been here throughout to nurture, care and support those children of keyworkers who were in school always going above and beyond to provide the children with some very special opportunities. Our team of LSA's in this lockdown took on a new role and found their feet in our Rainbow class bubbles leading learning for those children attending school. Our office team who have supported families and staff with advice over the telephone, prepared resources for those who need them, supported the use of IT both in school and at home, addressed many hundreds of postcards, and quietly completed many other unseen jobs that have helped our school to keep ticking over. Our premises team have kept our school sparkling clean – working late into the evening and early in the morning to ensure that the school has always been ready and prepared.

We will be reviewing our Home Learning policy over the summer and will share this with families in September as we recognise that some of our children will need to revisit and consolidate areas of learning during the coming academic year in order to build their confidence. We appreciate very much the way you work in partnership with us to do so!

HOLIDAYS DURING TERM TIME

We continue to be in receipt of letters informing us that children will be absent from school due to family holidays that have been rebooked. We <u>urge</u> families to avoid booking holidays during term time not only will this disadvantage your own children but it will also have a negative impact on other children in your child's class. We absolutely understand that families have not been able to enjoy holidays away from home together over the last year BUT the impact of lost school time is very significant for children across the country and by adding to this pressure, we are not working together effectively as a school community to meet the needs of all our learners.





We were so lucky to have glorious weather for sports day and the children had a brilliant time, coming together in their key stages to compete in their house groups through a series of activities linked to our learning behaviours of courage, determination, collaboration, positivity and reflection before the competitive races! Although different this year, our children seized the opportunity to celebrate being together as a school family and it was really quite emotional to see them coming together to make this special occasion. We missed our usual visitors but did find that some of our children were noticeably more relaxed and some competed who might not have done with a larger audience! We hope you have enjoyed watching our short films of the event and maybe even spotted your own little fish taking part! Huge thanks to Miss Axelsen for putting this together for us.

We would also like to thank Mrs Goodman for designing and coordinating the event in her role as PE lead and, of course, Curtis for leading the event. It has been wonderful to have Curtis in school three days a week throughout this academic year and he has become a loved member of our school community who our children

work exceptionally well alongside. We are delighted that next year Curtis will continue in this role and this will enable us to continue to personalise children's learning, giving opportunities for short-burst sessions to consolidate key concepts for children

Last week we said goodbye to Moira and children from each class presented her with beautifully colourful cards that the children had worked together to create. We will miss Moira and her contributions to our school family very much indeed and wish her every happiness in her retirement. Our little fish love and respect Moira very much and are so thankful for making our worlds a better place to be.





Respectful



As we come to the end of the summer term, we just wanted to update you on the work we have been doing on our 'Behaviour for learning and life' policy. If you haven't seen this yet, you can view it on our school website:

We began this piece of work last March when we went into our first lockdown and our staff team explored training provided by Releasing Potential. As a result of this training and further reading we had

done, we set out to revisit our policy on supporting children's behaviour because believe that:

- *Meaningful learning takes place when we have meaningful relationships.
- *Each young person is a part of a wider social system inside and outside Fishbourne Primary
- *Each individual is unique and it is essential to support them to develop a strong self-concept through an understanding of strengths, areas for development and a core belief that one can improve.
- *We can modify unacceptable behaviours by understanding the cause and providing appropriate support. (cont. overleaf)



On the last day of half term we held one of our favourite fundraisers of the year, Bend the Rules day! On this day, the children are allowed to bend the rules if they pay a small amount of money to Friends of Fishbourne School. This gave us a great platform to talk about why we have rules in school and beyond in the wider world! We started our day by sharing the fabulous story of 'You

Must Bring a Hat' by Simon Philip and Kate Hindley where we started our discussions about what happens when the rules aren't clear. Then we spent time reflecting on which behaviours are positive and which are negative. We realised that the problem with rules is that if there are too many of them, it's really hard to remember them all. In fact, penguin class talked a lot about all the 'silent rules' we have in school...ones that we just know and so don't talk about! So... we decided that what we needed was an easy way of remembering our rules and during the afternoon we collaborated together to come up with just three or four words that would cover everything! This wasn't as easy as it sounds! At 2.30pm we all came together on Zoom to share the words we had decided on and here are the ideas: ready, commit, responsible, prepare, alert, safe, aware, kind, polite, respectful, care, enjoy and positive

The final step was to arrive at just three or four words to support us in remembering our rules and these were:

READY? RESPECTFUL? SAFE?

You will hear us talking a lot about these words in the coming months



A few reminders about school uniform ahead of the autumn term!

We are aware that some of our children are wearing trainers currently and that school uniform has been tricky at different points during the school year as a result of shops

being shut. However, we request that all the children are wearing their correct uniform on our return in September, including proper school shoes (please note that children should not wear boots or trainers to school, even in the winter) and PE kits. Hair long enough to be tied back must be at all times when the children are in school.

We have adapted our PE kit to ensure that those children wishing to do so, may wear black shorts moving forward. The children starting with us in Reception class and those replacing PE kit as the children grow out of it, should please purchase black PE shorts. Leavers Hoodies for children in Year 6 must only be worn for trips, the residential visit and for PE sessions.
